

REGULAR MEETING OF APRIL 23, 2013

Mayor Cosgrove called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

In accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act, annual notice of all meetings of the Borough of Fair Lawn was published in "The Record" issue of December 14, 2012. Notices were also posted on the bulletin board located on the first floor of the Municipal Building; copies were mailed to The Community News and posted on the Borough of Fair Lawn website. The annual notice identified the meeting location and the time of Council Meetings and Work Sessions.

PRESENT: Mayor Cosgrove, Deputy Mayors Baratta and Trawinski, Councilmembers Peluso and Swain.

ALSO PRESENT: Manager Metzler, Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski, Assistant Municipal Clerk Bojanowski and Attorney Mondello.

Mayor Cosgrove asked the Police Explorer's, who were present, to lead the Pledge of Allegiance. Mayor Cosgrove stated that last summer he spent time with them at the Monmouth University Police Academy. The group works very hard and they did a great job while he was down there.

PROCLAMATIONS:

ZAK STEIN DAY

Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski read the proclamation. The Mayor and Council presented the proclamation to Zak Stein and his family.

MUNICIPAL CLERK'S WEEK

Mayor Cosgrove presented a surprise proclamation for Municipal Clerk's Week. He said they are very fortunate to have the Municipal Clerk and the Assistant Municipal Clerk, they do a great job. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski was the President of the New Jersey Municipal Clerk's Association.

COUNCIL COMMENTS:

Councilmember Peluso congratulated Zak Stein and his parents for all the fund raising they did to help the March of Dimes. He thanked the two Clerks for all they do to make sure they provide everything the Council needs and to get the information to move forward.

He thanked the Fair Lawn Explorers and Officer O'Brien. Earlier tonight they helped with feed back for a grant program they utilize to get funding through the State. All of these individuals were looking to join law enforcement. It was a pleasure spending the past hour with them and know they will make great officers one day. They are all well spoken, honest and well prepared. He thanked Officer O'Brien for all the work he was doing and for making this such a great program for the Borough of Fair Lawn. These kids are not only from Fair Lawn but surrounding communities as well.

Councilmember Swain stated that last Wednesday many of them were honored to celebrate the memory of Mary Ann Collura. It was so special to see all of the different Police units that participated and the beautiful wreaths that were presented. She encouraged everyone to take a moment to pause and reflect and remember Mary Ann Collura.

This week they lost a Fair Lawn resident, Nancy Wallace, who was a volunteer in Fair Lawn and Ridgewood. She served on the Board of Education, was a member of the League of Women Voters, was active in the Van Riper Ellis Church and a board member of the Ridgewood YMCA. Her heart goes out to Nancy's family and knows that all of the organizations she was involved with will miss her so much.

The Green Team will be hosting a composting workshop tomorrow. If you would like to know more about composting and reducing your waste come to the workshop at the Community Center at 7:30 p.m.

On June 9, the Borough along with the Green Team is hosting a 3K spring walk. They hoped that everyone will come out on that day and celebrate the community.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski echoed Councilmember Peluso's comments on the Junior Explorers and also Officer O'Brien. This was an example of a Police Officer who goes above and beyond as many of Fair Lawn's Police Officers do. He thanked him for what he does for those young people.

He also echoed Councilmember Swain's comments about Mary Ann Collura. It was hard to believe that it has been ten years. The Borough made a commitment to the Collura family that they would never forget. The ceremony and celebration of her life was truly an inspiring and remarkable experience.

He attended another memorial in the County which was for Joan Delassandro. Joan was a 7 year old Girl Scout in the process of delivering her last two boxes of cookies to a neighbor that lived three doors away. She was brutally murdered

on Holy Thursday in 1973. Her body was discovered in Harriman State Park on Easter Sunday.

Mrs. Delassandro was responsible, in her daughter's name, for four new statutes that protect young people. Joan's Law was signed by Governor Christie Todd Whitman and it provides that anyone who murders a child under the age of 14 shall never be eligible for parole. Her mother did that knowing that the law would not have retroactive effect and not apply to the killer of her daughter but would protect children in this state in the future. That law has been applied several times since then. New York State has also adopted the equivalent to Joan's Law and Governor Pataki signed it in Harriman State Park the very site where Joan Delassandro body was discovered. Congress of the United States at the urging of then Congressman Bob Franks passed a national Joan's Law so now it is the law in all fifty states.

Mrs. Delassandro learned that if the killers came into an inheritance or other source of funds would be entitled to keep those funds and be immune from suit because the statute of limitations for when the suit could be brought would have long since expired. She has worked tirelessly and recently achieved a legislative change that allows for no statute of limitations in those cases. She has recovered \$606 dollars from the killer of her daughter which she has given to the foundation formed in her daughter's name. Rosemarie Delassandro is truly a remarkable woman. The celebration of her daughter's life was as moving in its own way as the celebration of the life of Mary Ann Collura.

Deputy Mayor Baratta congratulated Zak Stein and his family saying he was an inspiration to all of them.

It was wonderful to see the Explorers and Officer O'Brien who always does a terrific job. When she first became a Councilmember, Officer O'Brien schooled her on the Explorers and what they do at Monmouth University and she learned a lot. It is not a walk in the park. They work very hard. They should be proud of their accomplishments.

Last week, they remembered Mary Ann Collura's sacrifice and they celebrated her life. She thanked everyone that made it possible. When she saw the very large American flag hanging from two fire trucks, it give her chills and made her feel so proud to be part of this town. She thanked Officer O'Brien and Detective Boone for helping with the program and all of the Emergency Responders and all of the Police Officers from all over New Jersey.

For Earth Day at Dunkerhook Park, the County planted fifty trees by the Naugle House with the help of the master gardeners. They did a terrific job. The park lost hundreds of trees with Hurricane Sandy.

Mayor Cosgrove thanked Officer O'Brien and Detective Boone and the whole Fair Lawn Police Department for the great job they did on the Mary Ann Collura remembrance. He also thanked the Collura family. He knows how difficult it is for them every year to come back here and remember but they also realize that for the many that knew Mary Ann, it provides closure for them.

He congratulated Zak and thanked him for his courage and dedication. He appreciated him coming here tonight to share that with everyone.

Mayor Cosgrove said that he went to the re-opening of the Lyncrest Landing which is a deck that was built in the wooded area. The deck was damaged but it showed how government can work together because the Borough, the Board of Education and Passaic Valley Commission all lent a hand to rebuild the deck. Lyncrest School Mayor Rio Matsumto officiated over the ceremony and then they had an Earth Day walk-a-thon.

This past week at Valley Hospital, all of the Mayors were invited to talk about the community outreach programs which Fair Lawn takes full advantage of. He thanked them for sending their employees to help make Fair Lawn a healthier community.

A garden was planted at the Opportunity Center with the assistance of the Boy Scouts, Emil DeLuccia, Scott Helfan and Doreen Yates.

Mayor Cosgrove mentioned Nancy Wallace, who was a friend of his. He was saddened by her sudden passing.

He spoke about "Access for All", a summit that was held in Hackensack in regard to the ADA. The next summit will be held in Fair Lawn on June 1 between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. He felt that Fair Lawn was leading the way regarding the ADA issues. Ridgewood was going to install handicap ramps in their pool but was blocked. Mayor Cosgrove offered to bring it to the Council's attention to allow the people from Ridgewood to use Fair Lawn's ramps this summer.

Mayor Cosgrove stated the Rotary Club Service above Self Awards Dinner will be held on May 10th. They will be honoring John Hoistma who is a 54 year volunteer fireman, Doreen Yates, who runs the Bridges program in the High School and Columbia Bank for all of their volunteer services. The cost is \$50 per person with a buffet dinner, beer, wine and soda. He can be contacted through the Mayor's office.

Manager Metzler stated the report is on the table without change.

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Baratta and a second by Councilmember Peluso, it was unanimously agreed to read the following ordinance by title.

POSITION OF DEPUTY BOROUGH MANAGER PURSUANT TO N.J.S.A. 40-69A-90

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Trawinski and a second by Deputy Mayor Baratta, Resolution No. 157-2013 introducing Ordinance No. 2273-2013 was discussed.

Councilmember Swain stated she would be voting against this ordinance for a couple of reasons. First she feels like this was done in a rush. This position was brought to their attention a week ago. She felt that it requires a little more thought. The Borough was also in a hiring freeze so she was not sure they should lift the freeze at this time. Eventually there will be a new Borough Manager and she felt that person should be part of the decision making process in terms of hiring for this position.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski felt this ordinance does not lift the hiring freeze. This ordinance does not infringe upon any rights or obligations on any future Borough Manager. It merely codifies what has been the practice in the Borough Manager's office for over a decade. This ordinance does not increase the number of personnel or increase any salaries.

Councilmember Peluso stated that during the Work Session he voted against it. Although it would not be adding an employee, there will still be a stipend that comes with it. At this time he felt they should not add any more salaries to the Borough payroll.

Mayor Cosgrove stated that he will be voting in favor of this because continuity is needed in the Borough Manager's. There have been five Managers in seven years. They need someone that they can rely on to know what was going on. He thought it would be a good thing for the people of Fair Lawn.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski told Councilmember Peluso that the stipend this ordinance will pay was far less than the stipends that the Council's in the past have given to other people that have stepped out of their positions to serve as the Borough Manager. The net effect of this change is that the total salaries will decrease. But then again they are in the silly season. It is an election year so that is what this is all about.

Councilmember Peluso stated they had this discussion last year. The residents of Fair Lawn know him; this is not an election gimmick. He was born and raised here. He cares about this community and he cares about the residents. The one issue that the residents keep telling him is that property taxes are too high. If they keep adding stipends, positions and new roles taxes will increase. He asked

everyone to stop with the campaign stuff. No one on the Council is running for election. They are all, hopefully, working for this community.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated creating an ordinance does not create a tax increase. It still requires a decision of the Borough Council to put someone in that position

There being no further discussion, Resolution No. 157-2013 introducing Ordinance No. 2273-2013 was passed with Councilmember Peluso and Councilmember Swain dissenting.

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Baratta and a second by Councilmember Peluso, it was unanimously agreed to read the following ordinance by title.

There being no comments by the public, upon motion by Deputy Mayor Baratta and a second by Deputy Mayor Trawinski, it was unanimously agreed to close the time for public hearing.

Upon motion by Councilmember Peluso and a second by Deputy Mayor Trawinski, Resolution No. 164-2013 adopting Ordinance No. 2267-2013 was discussed.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski asked that Manager Metzler explain this ordinance and ordinance 2266-2013.

Manager Metzler explained that Ordinance No. 2266-2013 established the rate for the current Blue and White employees. The difference between Ordinance No. 2266-2013 and 2267-2013 is that the bargaining units agreed to a 10% reduction in the salaries of new employees effective with the signing of their contract. As part of the agreement new employees hired will not receive longevity. Also the employees agreed to an increase in their co-pay for the health care from \$10 to \$20 effective January 1, 2014. The contract it allowed them to fine tune the use of flexible hours which will reduce overtime within the Blue and White Collar workforce.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski thanked the Manager, the Blue and White employees and CFO Palermo because he knew it was not popular in this day and age to be a municipal or government employee. The employees in the Blue and White Association have recognized the economic realities by in effect funding this contract increase through the give backs. They have also recognized the reality, in terms of agreeing to a new class of employees for the future employees whose salaries will start at a 10 percent reduction. It was a credit to Manager Metzler and the unions and CFO Palermo for achieving this. He thought it bodes well for the future of Fair Lawn.

Councilmember Swain agreed with Deputy Mayor Trawinski. She thanked the Borough employees because she felt this would make a difference in the long run and those are the sustainable differences they need to keep the budget sustainable.

Deputy Mayor Baratta echoed the comments of Councilmember Swain and Deputy Mayor Trawinski. Fair Lawn employees have always stepped up. The majority of them have a vested interest because this is their town and a majority of them live in Fair Lawn. These are not nickels and dimes; these are thousands and thousands of dollars. It is changes like this that will help keep the property taxes low.

Mayor Cosgrove said that sometimes as Councilmembers they talk about things that happened in years past and how it affects them now. This will amount to considerable savings here for the Borough. He also thanked Manager Metzler, the employees and CFO Palermo. He knows that future Councils will have fewer burdens because of these actions.

There being no further discussion, Resolution No. 164 -2013 adopting Ordinance No. 2267- 2013 was unanimously passed.

Councilmember Peluso stated the reason he would be voting against this ordinance is because there are two years of back to back 2 percent raises. None of the other negotiations that were done had back to back 2 percent raises. He looked at State contracts and found it was not common to see 2 percent raises back to back. He thought it was something they should not do.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski wondered what the percentage increase is over the life of the contract and when was the last time they had an increase under this contract. Manager Metzler believed it was 6 1/4 percent over six years.

There being no further discussion, Resolution No. 165 -2013 adopting Ordinance No. 2268-2013 was passed with Councilmember Peluso dissenting.

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Baratta and a second by Councilmember Peluso, Resolution No. 178-2013 was passed with Councilmember Swain abstaining.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Baratta and a second by Deputy Mayor Trawinski, it was unanimously agreed to open the time for public comments.

Howard Mark, 122-23 Ferry Heights, felt it was interesting that the Naugle property was rezoned for a park. Attorney Mondello advised that they have created a new zone. The new zone is called Public Open Space Zone and the Naugle House was put into that particular zone. Since this is the first reading of the ordinance this is what proposed. There are two functions of this zone, one is open space and the other is historic preservation.

Mr. Mark thanked the Manager for his role in saving the Naugle House. He said there is a problem with one of the mini bus drivers who has a medical problem. Manager Metzler reported that he hired a substitute driver for the mini bus so the issue should be resolved.

Mr. Mark spoke about the League of Women Voters and how they never used his question during their debate. He felt his freedom of speech was denied for not letting him read his question. Mayor Cosgrove said they spoke about this at the last meeting. They have different forums and in the time that is allotted they cannot get to every question. He suggested that he should address the League of Women Voters.

Mr. Mark asked if there was any news on the Vander Plaat property. Mayor Cosgrove explained that he met with the developer that purchased the property who has agreed to meet with the Historic Preservation Commission to talk about the properties. They will pick a date to meet with him. As of right now, the Council has no intention of purchasing the Vander Plaat property. It has already been purchased by a developer.

Mr. Mark asked what types of trees were planted by the Naugle House. Deputy Mayor Baratta said it was done through the master gardeners. She will get him the name of the trees. Some evergreens were planted towards the back of the lot and there were some leafy trees planted by the walking path and bicycle path. They planted about 35 different trees.

There being no further comments, upon motion by Deputy Mayor Baratta and a second by Councilmember Swain, the time for public comments was unanimously closed.






