

## WORK SESSION OF DECEMBER 3, 2013

Mayor Cosgrove called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

**PRESENT:** Mayor Cosgrove, Deputy Mayors Baratta (late) and Trawinski (late), Councilmembers Peluso and Swain. Councilmembers-elect Dunay and Lefkowitz.

**ALSO PRESENT:** Manager Van Kruijning, Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski and Attorney Mondello.

### **WALGREENS:**

Mayor Cosgrove addressed the issue of the possibility of Walgreens being built where Herold's Farm is currently located. He explained that the Borough just received drawings right before the holiday. They have not looked at it. Manager Van Kruijning said he forwarded the plans to the Construction Code Official for his review.

Mayor Cosgrove explained that the process of this is that the Construction Code Official will review the part that is in Fair Lawn which is a very small part. After review, the Construction Code Official will let the applicants know if they need a variance which would require them to go before either the Zoning or Planning Boards. The bulk of this project is in Glen Rock. According to the law, the residents will be notified prior to any hearing. There is not much more that can be told since Fair Lawn just received the plans. As a Borough they will look at this and keep people informed of what is going on.

Councilmember Swain stated that the Glen Rock Planning Board meeting has been postponed until January or February. She knows that they want to get input from the residents. As a former Planning Board member, she told the residents present that it was really important for each one of them to attend the meetings. The Glen Rock Planning Board needs to see how important this is to the Fair Lawn residents.

Mayor Cosgrove said there is a similar type of application on the border of Saddle Brook. The residents have been attending those meetings to voice their concerns. He thought it would be very advantageous to the residents to attend the meetings.

Councilmember Swain wondered if there were one or two individuals that can represent the group that would be willing to speak.

Miriam Levin, 42-39 Herold Drive stated that there was a proposal to rezone a portion of Keith Place. She asked what Glen Rock's obligation was to inform Fair

Lawn that this project was moving forward, as the neighbor's only learned about it by chance. Attorney Mondello explained that if Fair Lawn property was within 200 feet they would have had to send them a notice regarding the application. If the property is going to be rezoned they will send the Borough a notice. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski stated that the notice was received and given to the Planning Board. Attorney Mondello stated that if they were going from a residential zone to a commercial zone, the application may wind up in front of the Glen Rock Planning Board.

Shelly Bolton, 42-40 Herold Drive stated that the traffic will be going from Keith Place into Naugle Place and will affect Fair Lawn residents. Mayor Cosgrove stated that they do not have all the information yet. He promised that they will be vigilant to protect Fair Lawn residents and make sure things are done correctly. Ms. Bolton asked Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski when she received the plans. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski stated that she did not receive plans. By statute Glen Rock must notify them about the rezoning ordinance, which they did. The notice then goes to the Borough's Planning Board so they can see if there is anything they need to do.

Councilmember Swain asked for a consensus to request an analysis from the Planning Board.

There was consensus to have the Planning Board report back to the Council.

Steve Bolton, 42-40 Herold Drive asked if a blue print of the project available.

Norbert Florczynski, 41-35 Naugle Drive distributed copies of the plans. He asked if the plans showed two structures. Mayor Cosgrove stated that was correct. Manager Van Kruijning stated that Bottle King was moving across the street and they were building a Walgreen's.

Mayor Cosgrove stated that they will keep the residents informed once the plans have been reviewed by the Construction Official.

Joseph Kettell, 42-14 Naugle Drive asked if the small portion of property in Fair Lawn adjacent to Naugle Drive was zoned commercial or residential. Mayor Cosgrove did not know. Mr. Kettell felt that if it was zoned residential, the owners of Herold's Farm would have to ask Fair Lawn to rezone it. Attorney Mondello stated they would have to go to the Zoning Board and apply for a use variance. The Mayor and Council might not be inclined to re-zone. Mr. Kettell stated that his neighbors were concerned about traffic from Walgreens flowing into Naugle Drive from either a proposed side entrance/side exit or from Keith Place. He also expressed concern about Fair Lawn granting a variance that would allow them to proceed. Mayor Cosgrove stated that this information will be forwarded to Construction Official Bolan, who will then determine which

Board has to review the plans. He assured Mr. Kettell that the residents will be kept informed.

Doris Florczynski, 41-35 Naugle Drive asked if there would also be a traffic study, since they were planning to have 90 parking spaces. Councilmember Swain stated that they were asking questions they could not answer. It will go through the Planning and Zoning Boards in Glen Rock, as well as Fair Lawn.

Ms. Florczynski asked how the residents would be kept informed. Mayor Cosgrove stated that they could check upcoming agendas on the Borough's website for the Planning and Zoning Boards, as well as Council Work Sessions.

Tatiana Lomborg, 33 Meadowview Terrace felt it was a bad idea to build a 24 hour chain store that would bring non-residential traffic in and out. She was concerned about safety. Mayor Cosgrove stated that the Council understands the residents' feelings and knows they are opposed to the plan. However, all decisions must be made by the appropriate Boards. He thanked the residents for coming.

#### **CLOSED SESSION RESOLUTION:**

Upon motion by Councilmember Swain and a second by Councilmember Peluso, the following closed session resolution was unanimously adopted at 7:50 p.m.

**WHEREAS;** the Open Public Meeting act of the State of New Jersey permits the public to be excluded from certain matters to be discussed by the Governing Body; and

**WHEREAS;** the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Fair Lawn desire to discuss Personnel - Health Care (Frank Covelli); and

**WHEREAS;** these matters are ones which permit the exclusion of the public from such discussions; and

**WHEREAS;** minutes will be taken during this closed session and once the need for confidentiality no longer exists the minutes will be available to the public.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Fair Lawn that the public be excluded since these matters as set forth above are ones which permit the exclusion of the public from such discussions.

Mayor Cosgrove reconvened the Work Session at 8:10 p.m.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski arrived at 8:10 p.m.

**WARREN POINT WWI MEMORIAL:**

Councilmember Peluso referenced the letter they received from Mr. Storozuk asking that the World War I memorial relocated years ago from Warren Point School be put back. He would like to discuss this at the next Shared Services meeting. Having the memorial back at the school may foster questions from the students about World War I. Mayor Cosgrove stated that he forwarded Mr. Storozuk's letter to Superintendent of Schools, Bruce Watson. The Supervisor of the Parks Department said it would not be a problem for them to move the memorial back.

Councilmember Swain asked if they could send an email instead of waiting for the next Shared Services meeting. Councilmember Peluso stated that he would send an email to everyone on the Committee asking them to move forward as soon as possible.

Jim Storozuk, 27-15 Urban Place stated that Warren Point School was dedicated in 1921 and the bronze memorial was installed somewhere between 1921 and 1925 to honor men from Warren Point who served in the war. During the Vietnam War a school administrator asked to move the monument to the VFW building because it "glorified war" and replaced it with six peace poles. The VFW building was sold to the Cosmos Club, who has no objection to moving the memorial. He would like to see the memorial placed back under the flagpole in its original location, at the Warren Point Annex or to the right of the memorial at the Municipal Building. He searched for records about the memorial but all he could find was a newspaper clipping.

Councilmember Swain thought moving the memorial to Borough Hall was a good idea. Mr. Storozuk stressed that it was a Warren Point memorial, although he agreed that Borough Hall would be a nice alternative if the Board of Education says no.

There was consensus to have Councilmember Peluso discuss relocating the World War I memorial back at Warren Point School.

**REVIEW OF TENTATIVE AGENDA:**

Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski stated that she is adding a resolution authorizing the execution of an agreement with Municipal Nationwide Payment Solution and a professional service agreement with Third Party Administrators, IDA. They will have to reject the bid for Fire Department and Fire Prevention Uniforms because there was an anomaly in the sole bid. This will be re-bid after the first of

the year. CFO Palermo has asked to move the Cancellation of Unexpended Balances from Tuesday to the January 17<sup>th</sup> agenda.

Mayor Cosgrove asked if the Fire Department bid pertained to uniforms for new chiefs. Manager Van Kruijning stated that page 20 of the proposal containing price quotes for badges was missing. Mayor Cosgrove asked if there would be badges for the Fire Department Installation Dinner. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski stated there will not be enough time to do another bid before the end of the year, but the current bid does not expire until the end of the year so there may be time to place an order. She asked if he would like the rejection bid on consent or non-consent. Mayor Cosgrove asked that it be non-consent.

Manager Van Kruijning stated that the Nationwide Payment System resolution was for the acceptance of credit cards, beginning with Court. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski stated they had finally received approval to collect Municipal Court debt. Since the original contract was done in 2012, she is doing a resolution amending it and making it a two year contract. Manager Van Kruijning stated that the Administrative Office of the Court signed off on the contract.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski asked if "Cops in the Shop" was a grant for the hiring of officers. Manager Van Kruijning stated that it cannot be used for hiring Police officers; it is used for DWI patrols and undercover surveillance in liquor stores.

#### **COUNCIL LIAISON REPORTS:**

Councilmember Swain stated that she attended the fundraising event for the Philippines the day after Thanksgiving, which was a huge success. Senator Gordon and Assemblyman-elect Lagana also attended, as did Mayor Cosgrove, Councilmember Peluso and former Mayors Etler and Weinstein. Former Mayor Tedeschi helped organize the event. It was great to see people coming and going. Mayor Cosgrove stated that they raised over \$14,000 and packed a whole shipping container with clothing, food and health and beauty aids. The Counsel General of the Philippines was there.

Councilmember Swain reported that the ADA Committee has raised \$16,000 for the inclusionary playground. The Arts Council is considering hosting "Art in the Park" and will be doing a self portrait project in the spring. The Green Team has formed a sub-committee to review the Master Plan and offer input. The RRIC is meeting on Thursday.

She referenced the email they received regarding the intersection of Fair Lawn Avenue and Saddle River Road. The Council approved the No Turn on Red but they were advised by Traffic Safety Officer Franco that they have to wait for approval from the County because it is a County road. She asked for Council

consensus to help move this along so it does not take years to complete. She suggested sending a letter to the County to expedite this. Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated that he had the County Engineer looking out for the resolution. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski stated that the resolution went to the Freeholders Board. She will email him a copy. Mayor Cosgrove stated that Traffic Safety Officer Franco said that the County may have to put up the signs. He asked Deputy Mayor Trawinski to look into this and report back to the Council. Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated that he was also looking at the concept plan. Adam Strobel and Robert Abbotomarco were working on preparing the application to the State for the property they must acquire from Dunkerhook. They will also need a resolution next year endorsing the application. He will ask Freeholder Ganz to put it on the late agenda for December 18<sup>th</sup> so the Freeholders can adopt a resolution.

Councilmember Peluso stated that the Filipino Relief fundraiser was a great success and there were many volunteers on hand. Luke Walsh, former Fair Lawn High School graduate and current member of the Naval Academy organized a soccer game at Dobrow Complex, which raised \$650 for the Wounded Warriors project. Mayor Cosgrove thanked Superintendent Graff for helping Mr. Walsh obtain the field permit. Councilmember Peluso stated that Keith Brown volunteered to referee. It was a great event.

The Garden Committee will be working by the Library on Wednesday and Thursday at 12:00 p.m. Volunteers with some spare time can join them. There were no other committee meetings.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated that the Planning Board was scheduled to meet next Monday.

Councilmember Swain informed Deputy Mayor Trawinski that when residents living near Herold's Farm were in earlier to discuss the proposed Walgreens, she asked to that the Fair Lawn Planning Board give the Council a report. Deputy Mayor Trawinski suggested that Attorney Mondello find out whether Glen Rock has undertaken a study with respect to the rezoning. There is a Supreme Court case (Rea Finnegan vs. South Brunswick) that requires a comprehensive study.

Mayor Cosgrove reported that the Community Center will be hosting an Elvis Holiday Show on December 21<sup>st</sup>. The cost is \$40 per person and includes a buffet dinner and a show with an Elvis impersonator. Tickets can be obtained online or by contacting Mayor Cosgrove or Eric Van Kruiningen.

He attended the EDC Meeting and was asked to go to the Broadway Improvement meeting that same evening. The BIC voted unanimously to donate money towards the EDC. At the EDC meeting, he and Councilmember

Peluso met with NJ Transit and Maggie Peters from the Bergen County EDC. They have an aggressive schedule for funding the study of the Radburn corridor.

The Fire Department will be selecting the new fire chiefs tomorrow evening. With regards to the Filipino event, the residents of Fair Lawn are great. It was a nice event. He thanked everyone who participated. Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated that St. Anne's Church raised \$8,000 to \$12,000 at their masses. Mayor Cosgrove stated that Nelsie and Steve Parrado left today for the Philippines. All supplies will be shipped through the Rotary Club in Manila.

Councilmember Peluso asked who they should give any additional donations to. Mayor Cosgrove stated that they should be given to Joe Tedeschi, president of the Filipino American Association or Steve Parrado.

Mayor Cosgrove concluded by stating that there is a young Fair Lawn man with cancer at Sloan Kettering. The Fire Department wants to make him the honorary chief. The ceremony will take place at Fire Company #2 on Saturday at 3:00 p.m. and he will present a proclamation naming Christopher De Martino as Honorary Fire Chief.

#### **REVIEW OF ZONING BOARD'S ANNUAL REPORT - IMPERVIOUS COVERAGE ORDINANCE:**

Deputy Mayor Trawinski was recused from this matter. Attorney Mondello explained that the ordinance was ready to be introduced. He explained that this ordinance will allow the increase of the maximum impervious coverage permitted as long as one of the two approved paving systems are used. Pools were always considered impervious but now it would only account for fifty percent pervious.

Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski stated the ordinance will be introduced in January.

Councilmember-elect Dunay stated there were significant applications before the Zoning Board to do with pools. Attorney Mondello said the recommendations came directly from the Zoning Board, went to the Planning Board where it was vetted and then came back to the Council. Councilmember-elect Dunay stated that predominantly many of the applications are for above ground pools. Attorney Mondello stated this ordinance may eliminate some of those applications because now pools would not be considered 100% impervious.

#### **SAFETY AT BERDAN GROVE:**

Councilmember Swain stated this issue came up at the last ADA meeting. One of the members suggested they have some sort of safety device installed.

College campuses have buttons placed around the campus for safety reasons. She wondered if they wanted to look at instituting safety measures at Berdan Grove. Manager Van Kruijning will talk to Recreation Supervisor Graff about this. There was also another suggestion of motion detection lighting when people approach the park the lights will automatically go on.

Mayor Cosgrove suggested that Manager Van Kruijning look into it and get back to them.

There was a unanimous consensus to authorize the Manager to research this matter and report back to the Council.

#### **POLLING PLACES LOCATED IN SCHOOLS:**

Councilmember Peluso stated that he had a few parents who are concerned about the safety of the polling places being located in the schools. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski had told him that the polling place has to be located in a public building. There are several public buildings near the schools such as fire houses, the Municipal Building, etc. He came up with several places that could be used on Election Day. He felt in this day and age, having strangers walk into a school is not what it used to be. He found it disturbing that voters can walk through the school.

Mayor Cosgrove suggested having the Police Department take a look at this. Every school is used for voting. The Fire Houses are not owned by the Borough.

Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski said it was not up to the Council where the voting places will be. They can certainly make suggestions. The final decision is done by the County Board of Elections after they make their inspections. The location has to be ADA compliant and it has to be geographically located. The Fire Department does not work because they are not heated, they are not ADA accessible and they have no parking. This will be a very big issue for two days a year in only three schools. One of which is Forrest School which she believed they could move but it would disenfranchise the voters because they would have to walk all around the school. The High School does not have direct access but there is a resource officer present. The other school is Memorial. There was parking in the back where people could enter and walk down the steps but the Board of Education does not want people to use that entrance for safety reasons.

Mayor Cosgrove stated since there are only three schools involved, they should leave the polling in the schools and see about putting an officer on duty there. Mayor Cosgrove suggested that they notify Superintendent Watson, through the Manager, that they would like the Police Department to take a look and have the Manager report back to the Council.

Councilmember Peluso questioned the Borough's use of the Fire House. He thought they could still be considered a public building. Mayor Cosgrove explained that they are privately owned and do have to be ADA compliant. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski said if the Borough had a fire house that met all of the requirements that would be a permitted use. The Borough would have to have an agreement with them since they are not Borough owned. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski said that one of the issues are the polling location has to stay in the current location. Councilmember Peluso felt the Borough had enough public buildings so it could be switched. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski asked where the polling location would be if it were switched from Memorial. Councilmember Peluso suggested the Parks Department garage. Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski informed him that building has no heat. The County will not approve that building.

Mayor Cosgrove felt the Police should look at the existing facilities and move forward from there.

There was a unanimous consensus to have the Manager contact the Board of Education and let them know the Police Department will be reviewing this to make sure the children are safe during the election.

Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski stated that Superintendent Watson is extremely concerned about the children's safety and in face moved the entrance at Lyncrest School directly into the gym where the voting takes place.

#### **DONATION OF FIRE TRUCK TO BERGEN COUNTY FIRE ACADEMY:**

Deputy Mayor Trawinski recused himself.

Manager Van Kruiningen stated the Bergen County Fire Academy has requested the 1985 E One Pumper. This apparatus does not meet any of the NFPA standards to operate within a Fire Department. However, it does have an excellent pumping system. It would remain on the Fire grounds in Mahwah specifically to train fire fighters on pumping. Currently the Fire Academy is short on apparatus because they lend their equipment out. This truck would never leave the academy but it still has a good amount of years left to teach fire fighters.

He explained that he met with the Fire Department and the Chief and they do not have a problem with the donation of the truck to the Fire Academy.

There was a consensus to donate the truck to the Bergen County Fire Academy with Deputy Mayor Trawinski recused.

Manager Van Kruijning stated he had a resolution authorizing this donation for next week. He realized that both Mayor Cosgrove and Deputy Mayor Trawinski would be recusing themselves from voting on the resolution.

**INTERLOCAL AGREEMENTS FOR HEALTH OFFICER SERVICES:**

Ho-Ho-Kus and Ridgewood: Manager Van Kruijning stated that the Borough is currently providing Health Officer Services to Ho-Ho-Kus and Ridgewood. Health Officer Wagner has provided him with a memo indicating that both municipalities want to continue the agreements with Fair Lawn. She requested that the annual cost to Ho-Ho-Kus remain the same in the amount of \$6,250. She also wanted to continue with Ridgewood with a minor increase totaling \$8,500.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski expressed his concern about the future. Since Fair Lawn is such a large community and have the ability to provide shared services and if they do and it can increase the budget, it will adversely impact the cap which neither the Governor nor the legislature has addressed yet.

There was a unanimous consensus to continue with the Interlocal Agreements with Ho-Ho-Kus and Ridgewood.

**COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT ENDORSEMENTS:**

AAH of Bergen County, Inc. and Care Plus New Jersey, Inc. - Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski explained these are routine endorsements that are done. AAH of Bergen County, Inc. filed for a grant in the amount of \$15,274 for their permanent supportive housing. Care Plus New Jersey is filing for \$101,871 for children's services. While it does not impact the Borough's budget, they are using the funds in Fair Lawn therefore the Council would have to pass a resolution. Deputy Mayor Trawinski said in the past he has voted on these types of resolutions but asked Attorney Mondello for his opinion. Attorney Mondello advised that Deputy Mayor Trawinski has taken a very conservative approach so why change now. Deputy Mayor Trawinski said he will recuse himself.

There was a consensus to approve the two Community Development Block grant endorsements with Deputy Mayor Trawinski recused.

**MISCELLANEOUS PUBLIC COMMENTS:**

Deputy Mayor Baratta arrived at 9:10 p.m.

James Storozuk, 27-15 Urban Place, questioned the donation of the fire truck to Bergen County. He wondered if this truck was operational. Manager Van Kruijning stated it was a spare for Fair Lawn. Mr. Storozuk asked about its value. Mayor Cosgrove explained it does not meet the standards since all

personnel have to be able to ride in the truck. Mr. Storozuk asked if the Borough could get anything for the truck from the County. Deputy Mayor Trawinski informed him they could not because the County provides services for free.

Ruth Gormans, 39-37 Sycamore Drive, spoke about the mini bus. This morning she had a confrontation with the bus driver regarding a passenger. The bus driver did not like dropping the passenger off at her house. Elderly people ride the bus and they should not have to go to a specific stop. They should be picked up at their house. Mayor Cosgrove said that program is going to start. Ms. Gormans recognized that the Mayor did ride the bus. She wondered about the size of the new bus. Manager Van Kruijning explained the current bus holds fourteen passengers while the new one holds twelve passengers. Once the new bus gets delivered, the pickup and drop off program will be instituted. They will be able to call in and get picked up in front of their residence and brought to where they want to go and brought back home.

Ms. Gormans said that the bus driver was so mad. Mayor Cosgrove said that was a personnel issue. He suggested that after the first of the year, the Manager will devise a plan that spells it all out to the people on the bus. Ms. Gormans wanted a meeting so that it could be explained to the passengers. Mayor Cosgrove said he would be glad to meet with them. He suggested after the first of the year. Manager Van Kruijning said this new program is going to be evaluated after the first ninety days and he will provide a report back to the Council. Mayor Cosgrove said they would pick a date when it would be convenient for them to all be there.

Ms. Gormans spoke about the League of Women's Voters having a meeting next week regarding the women's right to vote in 1920 and Susan B. Anthony.

Walter Weglein, 18 Ramsey Terrace, spoke about the recycling grant the Borough received. He spoke about his recycling bin that is all banged up and when he brought it to Recycling they would not replace it for free. He wondered why those funds could not be put towards those bins. Manager Van Kruijning explained that some of that funding is used for educational materials but the bulk of that money is used to offset the cost of the day to day recycling, for example salaries, equipment and maintenance. Mr. Weglein wanted to go back to free recycling bins. Manager Van Kruijning said that was decision the Council would have to make. Councilmember Swain said she brought this up with the Green Team Chairperson and they will be discussing this next month. Manager Van Kruijning explained that the bins cost between \$40 - \$50 each and there are over 11,000 homes. Mayor Cosgrove said the Manager will look into this and evaluate it. Deputy Mayor Trawinski suggested that Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski pull the minutes from the last discussion about this. At that point they decided to stop paying for the bins.

Mr. Storozuk said one thing the newspaper cut out of his letter was about a young man from Recycling who would dump the contents and flip it in the air. He along with other residents called the Recycling office about this and it seems to have subsided. Mayor Cosgrove stated that the Manager will talk to Recycling about this and make sure it does not happen anymore.

Mr. Storozuk stated that two years ago Ron Lottermann distributed water bottles to the students in the High School so they would not use the disposable bottles. Apparently, he had money in the budget for that. Manager Van Kruiningen stated it was part of the grant. Mayor Cosgrove stated they will look into it.

Upon motion by Councilmember Swain and a second by Deputy Mayor Trawinski the following closed session resolution was unanimously adopted at 9:15 p.m.


Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Trawinski and a second by Councilmember Swain, the Work Session was adjourned at 10:10 p.m.




