

REGULAR MEETING OF DECEMBER 10, 2013

Mayor Cosgrove called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

In accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act, annual notice of all meetings of the Borough of Fair Lawn was published in "The Record" issue of December 14, 2012. Notices were also posted on the bulletin board located on the first floor of the Municipal Building; copies were mailed to The Community News and posted on the Borough of Fair Lawn website. The annual notice identified the meeting location and the time of Council Meetings and Work Sessions.

PRESENT: Mayor Cosgrove, Deputy Mayors Baratta and Trawinski, Councilmembers Peluso and Swain. Councilmembers elect Dunay and Lefkowitz were also present.

ALSO PRESENT: Manager Van Kruijning, Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski, Assistant Municipal Clerk Bojanowski and Attorney Mondello.

PRESENTATION OF PROPERTY MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE BEAUTIFICATION POSTER CONTEST AWARDS:

Mayor Cosgrove invited Property Maintenance Committee Chairman George Bate to the podium to present the awards.

George Bate stated that they had special awards for some special kids. He thanked the Board of Education, the Principals and teachers that participated in this contest. The Knights of Pythias has been gracious enough for a generous donation for the prizes. He also thanked the Mayor and Council for allowing them to make this presentation tonight.

Mr. Gate explained that the posters were from 4th graders from all of the schools in Fair Lawn. Certificates and a money prize would be awarded to the winners.

Jim Vanderbeck stated it was the Property Maintenance Committee's pleasure to judge the posters that were submitted. He presented an award for third place to Julia Maio for the outstanding beautification poster she created while a student at Westmoreland School.

Bob Harris presented the second place prize of \$50.00 to Itay Akad from Milnes School.

Itay Akad explained that when Fair Lawn is clean it is a beautiful scene. He got this idea from a movie. It starts out dirty and then it gets clean.

George Bate stated that they had a very hard time deciding who was going to win first place. They had so many posters to choose from. The first place winner was Jacob Caraballo from Warren Point School. His prize was \$100.00.

Jacob Caraballo stated when he was cleaning his front yard he was inspired to make the poster. When the front yard is clean, it's a beautiful sight.

Mayor Cosgrove congratulated all of the winners and thanked the members of the Property Maintenance Committee for judging the posters and doing the work.

COUNCIL COMMENTS:

Councilmember Peluso congratulated all of the winners and the Property Maintenance for putting the contest together. He also thanked the Knights of Pythias for sponsoring this event. Last week he, Councilmember Swain and Mayor Cosgrove attended their veteran's night where they had individuals that served in different wars tell their stories.

On Wednesday before Thanksgiving, many of the schools donated food to the residents in need. Human Services put out an e-mail that the food bank was running low and in the end almost every school donated food.

On the Friday after Thanksgiving the Filipino relief effort was fantastic with an outpouring of people within Fair Lawn and the surrounding towns donating goods and money. The members of the Filipino Association delivered the goods to the Philippines.

Also on that Friday, Luke Walsh, a Fair Lawn High School Graduate in the Naval Academy found out he will be accepted to the Marine Corps. He decided to host a charity soccer game and the money went to Wounded Warriors project and they were able to raise \$700.00. It was amazing to see him do all these wonderful things.

Councilmember Swain acknowledged the passing of Nelson Mandela. He was one who stood for compassion, resilience, leadership and courage. She heard President Obama say today that he speaks to what is best in all of us. She felt it was a wonderful quote. It was her hope that they all show the world that part of them every day.

Since Councilmember Peluso acknowledged the Knights of Pythias event, she expressed what a special honor it was because her father-in-law was a World War II veteran. It was very special to honor all of the men who fought for our freedom.

They are approaching the anniversary of the Sandy Hook shooting in Newtown, CT. It is important not to be silent on the issue of gun control. They must do everything they can to make sure that guns do not end up in the wrong hands.

Over the weekend she, Councilmember Peluso and Mayor Cosgrove were at an early Christmas party for the De Martino family. She said this was a family that was struggling and could use a miracle. She asked people to send their thoughts and prayers to them.

One of the soon to be high school graduates - Valerie Scolvar, a tennis champion was recognized by The Record as athlete of year. She wished her a lot of luck because she is going to Yale next year.

The Mayor and Council received a letter from the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission regarding the de-snagging of the Passaic River. There were over 2,000 tires that were collected and will be recycled.

As liaison to ADA Committee she shared their gratitude to the Mayor and Council, Recreation Department, Manager and to the many community groups for their support in all the initiatives that were undertaken this year. They also want to thank the residents, students and businesses who have sent in donations for the inclusionary playground that will be built. This truly is a community project and she along with the committee members appreciates everyone's help.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski spoke about the matters before the Planning Board. It received another portion of the Master Plan and there are only one or two portions left to come before the Planning Board. The Board indicated that it hoped to have the public hearings in February. They will be seeking substantial public input in appropriate circumstances such as River Road Improvement Corp. or Broadway Improvement Corp. The Board sub committees and professionals have done a tremendous service to the Borough.

The Planning Board also approved an application for PSE&G for a project to improve the reliability and capability of the energy infrastructure. There are two sites in Fair Lawn, one located on Evans Road and the other on Banta Place. That was his last Planning Board meeting.

This Sunday night is St. Anne's annual Christmas concert. All invited and there is no charge.

He wished everyone a very Merry Christmas and also a very happy, healthy and prosperous New Year.

Deputy Mayor Baratta congratulated the winners of the poster contest. She also thanked the Property Maintenance Committee for conducting the contest and to the Knights of Pythias for sponsoring the contest.

They just finished their first snow storm and hopefully the last. She drove around the Borough and the roads were nice and clean. She hoped that everyone had a wonderful Hanukah and hoped they have a Merry Christmas.

She mentioned that on Saturday at the Borough Hall Wreaths across America will be held. She thanked Mr. Seibel for bringing this to the Council's attention.

Mayor Cosgrove stated that he, Councilmember Peluso and Councilmember Swain had the honor of dedicating the parks garage to Matty Crogan. He served 33 years in the Borough and was very active in the community.

There were two Menorah lightings and he and Councilmember Swain were present along with Fire Marshal Bender.

He thanked Parks and Recreation Department, the Holiday Celebration Committee, the Chamber of Commerce and the Fire Department for the holiday tree lighting. Everyone enjoyed it.

While attending the Knights of Pythias veteran's ceremony he discovered that Joe Meer who has been on the Zoning Board since the 1980's received a Bronze Star during World War II which is one of the highest medals you can get in the military. He thanked him for his service to Fair Lawn and for his service to the Country.

Mayor Cosgrove spoke about raising over \$16,000 for the Filipino Relief Fund. They are sending a container of food, clothing and non perishables to the Philippines. It was a great effort because the whole community came together. The Filipino Association has to be congratulated for pulling it all together in a short period of time.

Wreaths across America will be held on Saturday at 12 noon. He mentioned that the Sunrise Rotary will be holding their annual First Day 5K Run on January 1st.

Mayor Cosgrove stated that the Manager wanted the public to know that on Friday, the Borough will be honoring the retirees and for length of service of the employees at 2:30 p.m.

He wished everyone a very Merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

Mayor Cosgrove said there will be another 5K Race to be held on January 26. Councilmember Swain said it was a fund raising event on January 26 at the Garden State Plaza. The money will be going to a number of charities. Mayor Cosgrove said it was in conjunction with the Super Bowl and is being called Big Game 5K.

Councilmember Swain stated that this truck was going to the County facility. Mayor Cosgrove said it does not meet NFPA Standards because under that standard all fire fighters have to travel to the fire in an enclosed cabin and this truck has an open cab. It will only be used to teach fire fighters how to use the pumper.

There being no further discussion, Resolution No. 404-2013 was passed with Deputy Mayor Trawinski recused.

Upon motion by Councilmember Swain and a second by Councilmember Peluso, Resolution No. 406-2013 was passed with Deputy Mayor Trawinski recused.

STATEMENTS FROM MAYOR AND COUNCIL:

Mayor Cosgrove stated before they go in to Public Comments, he wanted to say thank you to the former Mayors, Ed Trawinski and Jeanne Baratta. Ed has served on this Council for twelve years and Jeanne has served for eight years. Ed has been Mayor twice during his tenure and Jeanne has also been Mayor.

Anyone who has ever held elected office will tell you that you sacrifice a lot. He wanted to thank Ed and Jeanne's families for all the time and effort they have put forth to make the community what it is.

During their tenure, Deputy Mayor Trawinski and Deputy Mayor Baratta have made many positive contributions to the Borough. In 2006 when they were both elected to the Council, they promised to keep Fair Lawn first and they kept their promise. They gave the people who had been disenfranchised over the years a voice in government. The voters in 2009 gave them a landslide victory which gave them four more years on the Council.

Tonight they thank both of them for their time, talents and leadership that they have provided while serving on the Council. They will both be missed in Fair Lawn but he knew they still work for the County. The entire Council presented plaques to Deputy Mayor Trawinski and Deputy Mayor Baratta.

Councilmember Swain stated she has served with them for six years and while they have not always agreed, for the most part they have agreed on most things. She does know how hard they have worked. What is true are the hours that were spent, the hours they sacrificed not being with their families, hours taken away from their jobs to serve Fair Lawn. Fair Lawn is fortunate to have the Councilmembers they have. She thanked them for their service to Fair Lawn. She thanked Deputy Mayor Trawinski for the multiple times he served on the Council. She is reminded of the good times they had over the years. She wished them and their families success and especially with their jobs in the County.

Councilmember Peluso stated it has been a pleasure for the last two years to be serving with Deputy Mayor Trawinski and Deputy Mayor Baratta. What is refreshing about Deputy Mayor Baratta is there is no guessing on how she feels. He noticed that at times there are elements of the good old boys club but as a woman she has carried herself well. She has done a great job.

He has had the privilege on serving on committees with Deputy Mayor Trawinski especially the Board of Education Shared Service. His legal mind is outstanding. He has a wealth of knowledge on many subjects. He will miss his comments about the Kean administration. The one quote he will always use from Deputy Mayor Trawinski is that this Council agrees 96% of the time. Unfortunately when they disagree that is what the people hear about. When they go to events, they are always sitting together. They learn about each other families and they know it is tougher on the families than it is on them. He wished them both luck going forward.

Deputy Mayor Baratta thanked everyone for their comments. It has been her honor to serve on this Council for the past eight years. She is grateful to the residents of Fair Lawn who put their faith in her and gave her this privilege to serve. She had the great opportunity to serve as Mayor and now Deputy Mayor. She thought many of the memorable items that Deputy Mayor Trawinski and she were able to accomplish occurred when they were in the minority. They had a lot of fun in the minority. Passing the underage drinking ordinance in the bi-partisan manner is something she is very proud of. She thanked the members of the Alliance for Substance Abuse Prevention and the Fair Lawn Police Department for their guidance. It was not easy but it has been a valuable tool to help keep our children safe.

Their tenure here also brought about the inclusive holiday display with the addition of the menorah. These measures were done on a bi-partisan basis and also done with a lot of public input. They held forums for the residents so they could speak about it. Fair Lawn was one of the first towns to enact one of the strictest pay to play ordinance in the State.

Tonight is bitter sweet. She will miss visiting with you every Tuesday night but she is confident that they are in good hands with next year's Council and especially the terrific administrative staff headed by the new Borough Manager, Jim Van Kruijning, CFO Karen Palermo and our able attorney, Ron Mondello. There are many people she owes so much gratitude to especially the Municipal Clerk, Joanne Kwasniewski and the Assistant Municipal Clerk Marilyn Bojanowski and Marianne Pettineo who were always professional and who always were helpful especially when she was a newly elected official.

Fair Lawn is such a great town. Councilmembers come and go but Borough employees and volunteers are the backbone of the town. Every Borough employee has shown the utmost respect and assistance whenever they have been called upon. She thanked the previous Manager Tom Metzler, the men and women of the Police Department who she had the pleasure of working with on many issues. The volunteer organizations are second to none, Fire Ambulance, Rescue Squad and Auxiliary Police who so deeply care and give so much of their time to this town. She thanked them all for their service and your friendship.

Deputy Mayor Baratta said that she would be remiss if she did not talk about her fellow Councilmembers over the last eight years. She and Deputy Mayor Trawinski also joke that they are like a family, maybe a little dysfunctional but still a family. She mentioned Marty Etlar, unique in his own way who has become such a good friend. Owen McCarthy was a true gentleman and wished he could have served longer before he moved out of town. Steve Weinstein and she started out a little rocky but once they got to know each other, they worked well together for the common goal. She will even acknowledge Joe Tedeschi. Lisa Swain, Kurt Peluso and John Cosgrove, she knows that they all have the best interest of the residents of Fair Lawn and knows that is what they will work for. To the newly elected Councilmembers the best of luck was wished for them. Her door will always be open to all of them at any time. She joked about Deputy Mayor Trawinski having served in the Kean Administration. He is a wealth of information and knowledge. She cannot thank him enough for all that he taught her. She could not imagine doing this without him.

She thanked the residents from the bottom of her heart for these eight wonderful years. She has treasured them. To quote her son Ricky, when she told him it was her last Council meeting, he said, does that mean we will start getting

home cooked meals on Tuesday night. She wished everyone a Merry Christmas and a happy New Year! She wished that God continued to bless them all and this fine town.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated there were a myriad of thoughts whirling through his mind. He goes back to the first time he ran for office in this Borough which was 1987 when he ran with the former Tax Assessor Ed McKenna at a time that was very interesting. It was the first time he lost an election to Bob Gordon, there have been others. At that time he made a promise that he would never run for office again, his wife has repeatedly reminded him of that promise. He is like any other politician when it comes to telling the truth to their spouse. He told her tonight that this was it. He was not running for office again.

He remembered very vividly getting advice from former Mayor Lou Sprechman. He discouraged him from going door to door campaigning since after the first house Mr. Sprechman campaigned at he never went door to door again. Deputy Mayor Trawinski said he disregarded his advice and went door to door many times. He went door to door with the late Peter Seiden who became a friend. It was interesting when people asked them about national issues; Peter always said this was not Washington and not Trenton. He also went door to door with Marv Levitt. He remembered what Mr. Levitt has done for his career and for the town of Fair Lawn. There is not a day that he does not think of Peter Seiden. He was the consummate gentleman.

He echoed all of the names that Deputy Mayor Baratta stated including the current Councilmembers Kurt Peluso, Lisa Swain and John Cosgrove. He mentioned the late Flossie Dobrow, who was Mrs. Fair Lawn. She was incredible. What she gave to the Borough and what she taught him as a Councilman was phenomenal. John Keith served as a Deputy Commissioner of the DEP while he was on the Council in Fair Lawn. He was a wonderful human being and brought a different perspective to the Council. He mentioned Ron Mondello who he served with for a couple of months while he filled a vacancy. He also mentioned Matt Ahearn who ultimately defeated Ron Mondello for that seat and last but not least David Ganz. He and David have worked together for not only the people of Fair Lawn but also in Bergen County on a bi-partisan basis in the last several years. David Ganz is Wikipedia done over six or seven times.

The second piece of advice from Lou Sprechman was if you ever find yourself as an elected official referring to your town, it may be time to leave. He found himself doing that about a year ago and thought of the advice he received. He felt it was time to leave. The third thing was let your conscience be your guide.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski thanked his parents for without whom this would not be possible. He spoke about his late father who gave him his start in politics when in 1949 his father had a photo taken of him in the arms of a politician. To his Mother who advised him that she would be watching and he should keep the taxes down. He thanked them for their guidance and support. They truly are their mentors.

He mentioned his running mates and in particular Jeanne Baratta. They ran in that election being told that the people of Fair Lawn would not elect them one time let alone a second time. He thanked Deputy Mayor Baratta for her confidence in him allowing him to run with her and most importantly, her friendship and the friendship of her family. The Council is a dysfunctional family and he would be remiss for not thanking those members who give us the support all the time. He thanked Municipal Clerk Kwasniewski who was given tenure while he was Mayor, Assistant Municipal Clerk Marilyn Bojanowski, the various attorneys, Richard Lustgarten, Michael Kates, Bruce Rosenberg, the Giblins, Matt Giacobbe, and Ron Mondello, who have all been superb. The various Managers he has had the privilege to serve with, Bert Kendall who taught him so much about government, Tom Metzler, Tim Stafford and even Barbara Sacks and most recently Jim Van Kruijning.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated he has only had to work with two CFO's while on the Council. One was Barry Eccleston and the current CFO Karen Palermo, who is good and throughout the years will be even better.

Finally to his wife Diane, as he said before, this is really it. She will have to put up with him on Tuesday nights unless Deputy Mayor Baratta comes up with something at the County. He thanked her for the sacrifices she has made, his children have made and now his grandchildren, for allowing him to be a public servant. He loves each and every one of them.

To the current Council, Amy Lefkowitz, Dan Dunay he wished them all the best. Keep the taxes low and the services up. Let your conscience be your guide. God Bless them. Thank you to the people of Fair Lawn, may God continue to bless the people of Fair Lawn.

Mayor Cosgrove thanked them both and said they would be sorely missed but they will be calling upon them.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Baratta and a second by Deputy Mayor Trawinski, it was unanimously agreed to open the time for public comments.

Rich Seibel, 33-07 Halsey Road, reminded everyone that Wreaths across America will be held on Saturday at noon.

He thanked Deputy Mayor Baratta and Deputy Mayor Trawinski for their strong leadership and for always putting Fair Lawn first. He wished them both good luck. He knows they will be successful in whatever they do. Fair Lawn is a better place because of their hard work and dedication.

Steve Rinko, owner of Rinko Orthopedic, 25-09 Broadway questioned how much the Broadway Improvement Corp makes a year. Mayor Cosgrove explained how the assessment is done. Mr. Rinko wanted to know what they do for the money they received from the assessment. Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated they have advocated most recently with New Jersey Transit for traffic calming devices on Broadway, they received a grant for the one going in by Warren Point School, and in the future years they will be expanding. They have done a variety of promotional items towards Fair Lawn businesses. The meetings are public and are open to the public. Councilmember Swain mentioned that the signage was changed as people are approaching west bound on Broadway so that attention is given to the business district. Deputy Mayor Trawinski said they are working towards branding the business district. They have a regular maintenance program in the spring and the fall. They also do the ads in the Community News being done as a group rate. Councilmember Swain said they also do online marketing. Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated whenever the Borough talked about zoning changes on Broadway, they offered their opinions on behalf of the businesses. They have worked to develop a Master Plan on Broadway which the Borough has incorporated into their Master Plan. They are generally the ombudsman for the business community on Broadway.

Mr. Rinko questioned when their meetings are held. Deputy Mayor Trawinski informed him they are held on Thursday at the Community Center.

Mayor Cosgrove said they were instrumental on the parking restrictions that they lifted to help businesses along Broadway. He recommended that he go to the BIC meeting.

Mr. Rinko stated Broadway is a dirty street there is trash everywhere. The BIC comes twice a year to sweep up. The State is supposed to maintain Broadway. Mayor Cosgrove said they pay to have it cleaned more than twice a year. Mr. Rinko continued that a man came into his business telling him that he would throw it away in the trash. He felt he was being reprimanded because of trash in front of his building. It was a windy day. The man said he gave him a hard time the last time he was there. Mayor Cosgrove wondered if he identified himself. Mr. Rinko said he did not. He asked him to get off his property. Two days later he received a notice from Art Cumming which said the owner must

maintain his property free from litter. Mayor Cosgrove advised that Mr. Cumming is the Property Maintenance Officer who works for the Borough. He will have the Manager speak to Mr. Cumming about this. He recommended that he attend a BIC meeting.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski stated that most of the complaints are the result of Mr. Cumming coming out or from a resident that gives it to a Councilmember who then gives it to the Manager. He respectfully disagreed about him maintaining his property. He explained where he lives on a corner there is garbage on his front lawn that he is always picking up.

Mr. Rinko questioned how many Police vehicles the Borough had. Manager Van Kruiningen thought approximately twenty-six vehicles. Mr. Rinko found it amazing that Fair Lawn had that many vehicles. As a tax payer he wondered when it stops. He suggested that someone take control of things.

Deputy Mayor Trawinski told him that Fair Lawn was the fourth largest town in Bergen County. He thought it was remarkable that they only had twenty-six vehicles. Every year during the budget process, they look at the number of vehicles.

Mayor Cosgrove informed him that Fair Lawn was just chosen number one city in New Jersey to live in.



Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Trawinski and second by Deputy Mayor Baratta the meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.




