

## REGULAR MEETING OF APRIL 19, 2016

Mayor Cosgrove called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

In accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act, annual notice of all meetings of the Borough of Fair Lawn was published in "The Record" issue of December 18, 2015. Notices were also posted on the bulletin board located on the first floor of the Municipal Building; copies were mailed to The Community News and posted on the Borough of Fair Lawn website. The annual notice identified the meeting location and the time of Council Meetings and Work Sessions.

**PRESENT:** Mayor Cosgrove, Deputy Mayors Dunay and Lefkowitz, Councilmembers Peluso and Swain.

**ALSO PRESENT:** Manager Van Kruijning, Assistant Municipal Clerk Bojanowski and Attorney Mondello.

### **PROCLAMATIONS: DAYS OF REMEMBRANCE**

Assistant Municipal Clerk Bojanowski read the proclamation.

Mayor Cosgrove stated that the Borough of Fair Lawn has been the home for many holocaust survivors. Many of them are still alive and in their 90's. He has had the pleasure of meeting many of them and they are extraordinary people. To think of the horrible things that have happened to them in life and to see what they did with their lives is an incredible act of courage. It is only right and fitting that they do remember those people who did survive and those who lost their lives.

### **COUNCIL COMMENTS**

Councilmember Peluso stated that the Mayor, Councilmember Swain and he attended the Company 4 swearing in event. He congratulated all the new officers.

The Garden Committee was working on the Arboretum early this morning. It is beautiful and what they have done in a year is stunning. If anyone was interested in weeding and mulching they are always looking for new members.

The Pool Committee met. Memorial Pool will be opening shortly. The Borough has gotten a grant for \$100,000 to bring in a lot of new activities to the pool and to freshen up the area. Last year they saw record amount of attendees and are hoping the trend continues this year.

Yesterday Mayor Cosgrove, Councilmember Swain and he attended the Mary Anne Collura memorial. He thanked the Police Officers for putting it together. When the tragedy occurred members of the Police Department and residents vowed they would never forget Mary Anne Collura and everything she did for the community.

Councilmember Swain commented on how remarkable that 71 years later they are finding themselves looking at ethnic groups that are facing persecution today during this political campaign season. She urged everyone to stand up against racism, against bigotry and intolerance and to make a stand for inclusion and acceptance. Yesterday they honored a slain Police Officer who stood up for children in our society. It is so important to remember all of these events in our history and learn from every one of them.

The ADA Committee held a luau dance. She thanked the Alliance for funding the dance and the Fair Lawn High School students that came out to decorate the gym along with cleaning up and handling refreshments.

She along with Mayor Cosgrove and Councilmember Peluso attended the Knights of Pythias luncheon where they honored Doug Charipper as their new Grand Master. The Knights are a wonderful organization that raises money and then gives back to many organizations in town.

Councilmember Swain mentioned the Art's Council's poetry reading which will be held on May 15th.

Deputy Mayor Dunay commented that it is important to remember every year the holocaust. Multiple generations have passed since World War II. By speaking about these things future generations are made aware of what took place. He mentioned that all of the holocaust survivors in the United States are also immigrants. He thought it was important to remember the contributions that immigrants have made.

He thanked the Borough Manager and CFO Palermo for the long term financial planning meetings. Manager Van Kruijning continues to think of creative ideas to try to ultimately protect Fair Lawn's finances, save money over the long term and secure many of the good things for the residents' day in and day out. Many Boroughs' are now introducing their budget but Fair Lawn passed the budget over a month ago which goes to show how prudent Manager Van Kruijning and CFO Palermo are in managing the finances. He thanked Manager Van Kruijning, CFO Palermo, and the Mayor and rest of the Council for everything they have been able to work on together in making sure they continue to do good things for Fair Lawn.

Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz concurred with the statements that were made by her fellow Councilmembers. One of the things that is important as they approach the Days of Remembrance as well as the holiday Passover, several of them have young children and struggle of what point they introduce some of this information to them. It is very important that this history continues to be taught in the schools so that the children can remember and that the survivors did not go through what they went through in vain.

She attended the Mary Anne Collura fundraiser at the Fair Lawn AC which was an amazing event. Every year it seems that more people attend with their hearts in the right place remembering everything she stood for. She thanked everyone that put that together and made it possible as well.

She congratulated Mayor Cosgrove who will be receiving a Distinguished Citizen's Award from the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The Center for Alcohol and Drug Resources is sponsoring a program called Strengthening Families. She explained that the program is for parents and youth to come together with many skills being taught to help strengthen the family. The next program will be held at the Van Riper Church and it starts on April 25th.

Through her role as liaison to the Alliance she was contacted by a young college student who would like to interview her regarding some of the issues that are facing the residents of Fair Lawn. It was so nice to see people taking an interest in our town and what was going on with the residents.

Mayor Cosgrove mentioned Mrs. Di Cosmo who died at 95 years old. She was a tiny lady with a huge heart who had over 80 foster children. She adopted her son Anthony at the age of 65 years old. He knew her very well and was a great person. He also extended his condolences to the family of Jay Brunt who was a long time street hockey coach. Unfortunately he passed away. He will be remembered as someone that put in a lot of effort to helping the youth of Fair Lawn.

Mayor Cosgrove attended the Matzo making at Bris Avrohom. It was great to be working with the children and the rabbi's. He also attended the St. Anne's Breakfast. He was a guest bartender at the Fair Lawn Athletic Club for the Mary Anne Collura fundraiser. Mayor Cosgrove thanked Dave DeLucca and the members for putting on a great event. The Borough has always made a promise that they will remember Mary Anne. He thanked the PBA and Chaplain David Boone for a very nice ceremony.

Councilmember Swain commented that Mayor Cosgrove, Councilmember Peluso and she attended Civics for Citizens that was held at the high school.

They had to answer questions on their cell phones. It was an interesting evening and a fun way to learn about civics.

Mayor Cosgrove said it was very interactive by using an application on the cell phone which showed the score as you go along.

Councilmember Swain pointed out that this ordinance will allow for a 50% discount on pool membership fees for residents and their families who are active Military, Veterans National Guard or Reserves. She thanked Councilmember Peluso for bringing this to the Council.

There being no further discussion, Resolution No. 165-2016 introducing Ordinance No. 2385-2016 was unanimously passed.

Upon motion by Councilmember Swain and a second by Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz, it was unanimously agreed to read the following ordinance by title and open the time for public comments.

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Dunay and a second by Councilmember Peluso, Resolution No. 169-2016 adopting Ordinance No. 2377-2016 was unanimously passed.

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Dunay and a second by Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz, it was unanimously agreed to read the following ordinance by title and open the time for public comments.

There being no comments by the public, upon motion by Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz and a second by Councilmember Swain, it was unanimously agreed to close the time for public hearing.

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz and a second by Deputy Mayor Dunay, Resolution No. 170-2016 adopting Ordinance No. 2378-2016 was unanimously passed.

**PUBLIC COMMENTS ON CONSENT AGENDA ITEMS ONLY**

Upon motion by Councilmember Peluso and a second by Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz, the time for public comments on Agenda items only was opened.

George Stafford, 16 Kitchell Avenue, Wharton, New Jersey, member of the Highlands Coalition was there to speak about the resolution "Supporting Clean Water Supplies" on the Consent Agenda. He spoke about the loss of 127,000 acres of farm land since 1996 as well as 167,000 acres of forest. Those are areas that recharge the water supply. He urged the Mayor and Council to pass Resolution No. 173-2016. The Highlands Commission, the New Jersey Sierra Club and ANJAC urged the Council to pass this.

Mayor Cosgrove thanked him for coming all the way from Wharton and informed him that all of them have already endorsed this and that is why it is on the Consent Agenda.

Councilmember Peluso thanked Mr. Stafford for coming tonight and for the great work he does on the Highland Commission.

There being no further comments from the public, upon motion by Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz and a second by Councilmember Swain, the time for public comments was unanimously closed.

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz and a second by Councilmember Swain, Resolution No. 186-2016 was passed with Deputy Mayor Dunay abstaining.

**PUBLIC COMMENTS**

Upon motion by Councilmember Peluso and a second by Deputy Mayor Lefkowitz, it was unanimously agreed to open the time for public comments.

Marc Colyer, 39-08 Van Duren Avenue, commented that they heard that in the last 20 years the State has lost thousands acres of farm land and open space which are needed for the replenishment of the water supply. According to the DEP the area in question is a wellhead protected area which means it regenerates the aquifer.

At the last Council meeting he introduced a gentleman who wanted to farm the Naugle House property. If the Mayor and Council bought and preserved the Vanderbeck property they could easily extend that farm on to that property and have close to five acres of farmland that would not only sustain the water supply but would sustain the people of Fair Lawn with fresh food.

Mr. Colyer thought it was unethical that the developer was paying the town for a report on how to change the Master Plan to support his plan.

Attorney Mondello explained that was not correct. The Governing Body paid to have the Planner research that. Once the Planner came back and said it was in the best interest of the Master Plan and the Municipal Land Use Law and the town, the developer paid the Planner to draft the ordinance which is not unusual. There will be an entire section for public comments to speak about this ordinance at the next meeting.

Mr. Colyer felt it would be fair to hire the same Planner to give ideas to the Borough for ways to preserve and protect the property.

Mr. Colyer stated for years he has been collecting rain water and using it in his garden. He learned at the Green Fair that it was not a good idea because modern shingles have antifungal properties and other chemicals on them that make it not safe to water the vegetables.

Pamela Coles, 13-34 George Street, spoke about the Parking Enforcement Officer. Mayor Cosgrove explained that the Borough has been able to hire a part time ex-police officer who can enforce the parking regulations.

Walter Tuers, 17 Richmond Avenue, Ridgewood, stated his concern about the Vanderbeck property. He understood that the time will come at the next meeting to discuss it.

Howard Mark, 12-23 Ferry Heights wondered if there was a written agreement between the Borough and the developer of the Vanderbeck property. Attorney Mondello advised that there is no written agreement. The developer has to go before one of the regulatory bodies either the Planning Board or Zoning Board. In this case he believed if this ordinance passes it will be the Planning Board.

Walter Tuers commented that the Historical Commission drafted a strong letter opposing the sale and development of the property. He felt they were fulfilling their duties. The woman on the commission who was also a member on the Planning Board put the brakes on it. He thought it was a conflict because she was on the Planning Board and voted in favor of it. Mayor Cosgrove stated that the Historic Preservation Commission agreed to the change of the use and the Planning Board unanimously agreed to the change of use and the Planner sent the recommendation for the change of use. He explained that the house would be saved and will not be knocked down.

Mr. Tuers reported that work has already been done on that house. Mayor Cosgrove stated that the Borough does not own the property. The heirs own it

and the Borough cannot stop them from doing demolition. Mr. Tuers felt that the town should have stepped right in and referred to the Master Plan. They could have taken it by eminent domain. Attorney Mondello disagreed with him.

Mayor Cosgrove explained that the town approached Mrs. Vanderplaat about purchasing the house with open space funds and she said no. The Council sent the Attorney to the heirs to see if they would sell it and they said no. The heirs sold the property for a few million dollars which the Borough could not afford. No one can stop them because they still own it. He stated if the Borough were to purchase this property they would have to lay off 10 to 12 employees.

Attorney Mondello advised that if the Governing Body voted in favor of this ordinance which had the first reading today which is a rezoning, the developer will go to the Planning Board and they will follow some of the language that was put in the ordinance. A portion of the Vanderbeck house will be open to the public and for use by the Historic Preservation Commission. They may also put in restrictions that the Vanderbeck house has to be maintained and restored to the maximum extent practicable. The Planning Board will hear testimony on this development.

Mr. Tuers stated he was a descendant of Jacob Vanderbeck and is very upset about this development. Mayor Cosgrove explained that the Borough owns the Naugle House and has invested millions of dollars in to that house. This money is from the taxpayers of Fair Lawn. The Borough cannot afford to invest money in the Vanderbeck house.

Attorney Mondello stated that the developer on his own accord gave the Borough a moratorium for six to nine months to explore some other ideas.

Mr. Tuers stated that the Naugle House sat there too long and government procedures take too long. The building was in good shape when it was left. He sees neglect by Fair Lawn. Mayor Cosgrove informed him that a historic architect had to be hired before they do anything which cost \$50,000. Attorney Mondello advised that they cannot order Borough employees to go on private property and make repairs.

Rich Siebel, 33-07 Halsey Road, thanked the Mayor and Council for the Days of Remembrance proclamation. There are less and less holocaust survivors. He remembered as a kid his grandparents and parents talking about getting out of Germany and Poland along with the horror stories they told. He thought with Passover coming up what they were doing was very admirable. They can never forget the sacrifices that were made. Mayor Cosgrove spoke about a story he heard from one of the survivors who was so disconnected from the world they did not even realize the United States were involved. When the tanks came in

they did not know who it was at first then they saw the flag and knew it was the Americans and they were safe.

Mr. Seibel mentioned the change in the traffic light on River Road and Morlot Avenue. All his life he has battled that corner. Now he feels the Borough has hit a home run with it because it makes life a lot easier and safer. Mayor Cosgrove added that there was a lot of coordination. He thanked Manager Van Kruijning, Engineer Garrison and Borough Electrician Bob Kittler for the work they did on it. It took 16 straight hours by the County of Bergen, Public Service and the Borough. There is now there is a 20 second delay for the cars on Morlot Avenue. Mr. Seibel said this intersection has been a thorn on the side for many administrations.

Councilmember Peluso stated that everyone on the Council worked hard on that intersection. They were able to get lights on Broadway near the train station. The next goal is Saddle River Road and Fair Lawn Avenue. They are working with the County and it should be done next.

He mentioned the Vanderbeck house and how the underlying theme was money.

In regard to parking tickets with Police, as a Councilmember, people forget that they are not above the law. He left his car on Harley Place and received a ticket for overnight parking. He was glad to see that the regulations are enforced.

Pam Coles, 13-34 George Street, stated she had fought for the Naugle House from 2003 to 2011. The decay occurred during those eight years. The total amount of money between Green Acres and the grant was \$1.2 million dollars. Literally overnight the developer had asked for \$2.3 million dollars because he saw the value of the Naugle House. The Vanderbeck house is not owned by the Borough. She felt this was a great way to develop it for seniors and leave it open for the Historic Commission and residents. This was the perfect plan.

There being no further comments, upon motion by Deputy Mayor Dunay and a second by Councilmember Swain the time for public comments was unanimously closed.

#### **CLOSED SESSION RESOLUTION - PENDING LITIGATION - POLICE RETIREES**

Upon motion by Deputy Mayor Dunay and a second by Councilmember Swain, the following closed session was unanimously adopted at 8:40 p.m.

**WHEREAS;** the Open Public Meeting act of the State of New Jersey permits the public to be excluded from certain matters to be discussed by the Governing Body; and

**WHEREAS;** the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Fair Lawn desire to discuss Pending Litigation - Police Retirees; and

**WHEREAS;** these matters are ones which permit the exclusion of the public from such discussions; and

**WHEREAS;** minutes will be taken during this closed session and once the need for confidentiality no longer exists the minutes will be available to the public.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Fair Lawn that the public be excluded since these matters as set forth above are ones which permit the exclusion of the public from such discussions.

**ADJOURNMENT:**

Upon motion by Councilmember Peluso and second by Councilmember Swain the meeting was adjourned at 8:57p.m.
