

## WORK SESSION JULY 14, 2009

Mayor Weinstein called the meeting to order at 7:34 p.m.

In accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act, annual notice of all meetings of the Borough of Fair Lawn was published in the Record issues of December 16, 2008. Notices were also posted on the bulletin board located on the first floor of the Municipal Building and the Maurice Pine Free Public Library. Copies were mailed to The Community News and posted on the Borough of Fair Lawn Website. The annual notice identified the times and locations of the Council meetings and work sessions.

**PRESENT:** Mayor Weinstein, Deputy Mayors Swain and Tedeschi and Councilmembers Baratta and Trawinski.

**ALSO PRESENT:** Acting Manager Kwasniewski, Assistant Municipal Clerk Bojanowski and Attorney Rosenberg.

### **CLOSED SESSION:**

Upon motion by Councilmember Baratta and a second by Councilmember Trawinski, the following Closed Session resolution was unanimously adopted at 6:33 P.M.

**WHEREAS;** the Open Public Meetings Act of the State of New Jersey permits the public to be excluded from certain matters to be discussed by the Governing Body; and

**WHEREAS;** the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Fair Lawn desire to discuss Personnel – CFO Interviews, Appointments to Garden Club, Attorney/Client Privilege – William Street, Maple Avenue Condemnation and Naugle House; Lease Negotiation – Chase Bank and Attorney/Client Privilege/Pending Litigation – Landmark/Fair Share; and

**WHEREAS;** these matters are ones which permit the exclusion of the public from such discussions; and

**WHEREAS;** minutes will be taken during this closed session and once the need for confidentiality no longer exists the minutes will be available to the public.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Fair Lawn that the public be excluded since these matters as set forth above are ones which permit the exclusion of the public from such discussions.

### **EXPLANATION OF DRUG FORFEITURE FUNDS:**

Chief Rose was in attendance. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated he was confused about the amount of money that is in that fund and initially thought it was in the budget. Chief Rose said it is commonly known as Drug Forfeiture Funds that every Police Department has one of these funds which are administered by the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office. Procedurally, what happens is if there is a crime, and somehow there is cash found, dealing drugs from the vehicle, etc, they can attempt to get it for forfeiture. Within 48 hours they fill out forms, if it is a vehicle, the forms move within 48 hours and

they store the vehicle pending final verification. If it is cash it must be sent to the Prosecutor's Office within 48 hours. The Prosecutor's Office keeps the cash. Once the paperwork is filed, typically it takes several years to get a response. If forfeiture is used, it is usually by a Superior Court; however there may be a plea bargain, the Borough would get the money back or a percentage of it. If there is forfeiture and no involvement with the Prosecutor's Office, the Borough would get 70% of the funds collected. If there is more than one jurisdiction, it would be broken up between them.

Chief Rose explained the balances for 2000 - \$5,200, 2001 - \$3,100, 2002 - \$3,300, 2004 - \$3,800, 2005 - \$3,800, 2006 - \$1,100, 2007 - \$18,000, 2008 - \$45,000. In June the balance was \$53,000. He explained the big jump in the balance was due to having more officers working with the Prosecutor Task Force. He did not anticipate receiving that much again. If he wants to spend any of that money, he would have to send a letter to the Prosecutor explaining the positive effect it would have on his department's law enforcement efforts. He gave examples of what the funds were used for in the past such as the time lapse recorder, USB flash drives for the detectives, a prisoner transfer van and hand held digital recorders. If he has a catastrophic failure in the Radio Room, at least he would have those funds to offer to the Council. At some point in time, if they replace the Radio Room, perhaps the funds could be used for an architect to see if the space is used wisely.

Deputy Mayor Swain asked if they would buy a vehicle that is not in the budget. Chief Rose stated they typically won't do vehicles. The position from the Prosecutor's Office is that those items are typically budgeted for.

Deputy Mayor Tedeschi thought the funds were from the adjudicated cases and seizure of property or cash. If the items the Chief were requesting were not in the budget, he could apply to the Prosecutor for those items, such as the hand held recorders. Chief Rose stated that was right, they were not in the budget. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi said that the Chief could not supplant what was in the budget, but perhaps he could anticipate not putting things in the budget by using these funds. Chief Rose said he was not going to do that. If something comes up and is not in the budget, he can ask the Prosecutor's Office.

Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated they would have to define budget, the budget as adopted by the Council, not as proposed. He asked how they knew there was a balance of \$53,000. Chief Rose stated that periodically they get a statement from the Prosecutor's Office.

Councilmember Baratta stated that there must be someone in his office that is keeping tabs on this. Chief Rose stated when they get the statement they match it up to make sure it corresponds.

### **REVIEW OF TENTATIVE AGENDA (7/21/09):**

Councilmember Trawinski reminded Acting Manager Kwasniewski about the resolution for the County Open Space. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated they would have to do a few of them. Assistant Municipal Clerk Bojanowski added that resolutions for the

Approval of Fire Board actions and two massage establishment licenses would be added.

### **COUNCIL LIAISON REPORTS:**

Deputy Mayor Swain stated they had the Planning Board meeting last night and set up a subcommittee for the Master Plan consisting of Todd Malkin, Baruch Gadot, Phil Cassidy and Joe Baladi. The old Hiway Theater, which is becoming a medical establishment, came for a minor review of some office space so they needed more parking spaces. They also talked about enforcement, for example one place has not gotten their Certificate of Occupancy for five years now. The Board wants to talk about better enforcement. The Board's Engineer is going to look into what can be done so this does not happen. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated it is the Building Department that does the CO's. Since not much is going on, they have been pulling files to go through them. At the height of construction they did not have the staff to go through the temporary CO's. She asked if Deputy Mayor Swain had a particular one to let her know so she could let the Building Department know. Deputy Mayor Swain said there were specific ones they discussed that should be addressed. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated she would ask the Planning Board secretary for the names. Councilmember Trawinski stated they would need to be careful with this because they need to understand the decisions issued with the TCO are solely under the province of the Building Inspector. They cannot interfere with Building Inspector's performance of his duties.

Deputy Mayor Swain stated they talked about fire safety. When a development comes to the Planning Board they always want to know what the fire board said about it. She wondered who signs off on the plans. Attorney Rosenberg advised the Fire Marshal reviews all site plans.

Councilmember Baratta stated the Farmer's Market started on Wednesday and it was successful. They are expecting more vendors to come on board. At the end of the day when the vendors were cleaning up, they were throwing out some of the produce so she took it and brought it to the food pantry. She will find out if this will happen every week so she could let the Health Department tell their clients they can stop by on Thursday.

Councilmember Baratta said she attended the LEPC meeting. Health Officer Wagner will be attending a conference dealing with the Swine Flu problem. Depending on what she brings back from the meeting it may be something the Council would have to look at.

Councilmember Baratta stated the planting at Plaza Road has been done and it looks very nice.

Councilmember Trawinski stated the ADA Committee meeting is at the end of the month. The BIC is in September.

Deputy Mayor Tedeschi said he had no reports.

Mayor Weinstein stated that the Fire Board would like to have Eric Reamey get packages from the Planning Board and Zoning Board. This would make the process more efficient. The Fire Department's 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary is in 2011, there will probably be a wet-down at Memorial Pool. They will find out more in September when they hold their meeting. The Fire Department was in the Ridgewood 4<sup>th</sup> of July parade. They won second place, best appearance - color guard, first place – best appearance pumper Engine 4, first place – best appearing truck #1, and first place – best appearance in parade uniform for the whole company.

**CHASE BANK PARKING:**

Mayor Weinstein stated he would like a consensus of the Council to follow up on two hour parking or metered parking and overnight parking in the Chase lot. Councilmember Trawinski asked Acting Manager Kwasniewski to let the RRIC know about this.

Don Smartt was present and said they were aware of that and they do support the recommendations of the Traffic Safety Officer. Mayor Weinstein stated they are going to go back and confirm that.

There was a unanimous consensus to have the Manager look in to the parking issues.

Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated she would report back to the Council in September.

**CLARIANT RE: MEETING WITH OWNERSHIP:**

Mayor Weinstein stated they had asked Attorney Rosenberg to reach out to the owners of Clariant to come in and give them an update. They received a letter from the developer who was acting as the agent. He wondered if they want to meet with the agent or just wait until the owners come to the table. The Borough needs to know where they are with the DEP.

Attorney Rosenberg advised that they had done the resolution. He spoke to Senator Gordon, who advised him that he would reach out to a representative with the DEP to try to see whether or not they could bring some pressure for them to act upon the remedial action work plan that has been sitting with the DEP for more than eighteen months. He recommended that the Council not meet with Clariant until they hear from Senator Gordon to see what the DEP will do.

Councilmember Trawinski stated that although he was disinclined to meet with the developer, he would be willing to meet with the property owner. If they meet with the developer, the public's perception would that they would be trying to cut a deal for development. The Council just wants to know when this property is going to be remediated in the context of developing the Borough's COAH plans.

Councilmember Trawinski stated he liked Attorney Rosenberg's suggestion to explore it through the DEP directly.

There was a unanimous consensus to proceed with Attorney Rosenberg's suggestion.

**ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ISSUES:**

Don Smartt was present. Mayor Weinstein stated they met last Tuesday and there were three issues to be discussed. He continued that they have reached out to the grant writing firm for grants to improve the Broadway area, pedestrian safety and other issues. The Borough had received a CDBG grant in 2007 of more than \$110,000 and has only used a small portion of that money. If they don't use the money, they will lose it, which may hurt the request for funds in other areas. The EDC would like to have the money reclassified for other uses. A starting point would be the coordination meeting to see what was requested from the grant writing firm, what they should ask the County for through this Community Development grant. A meeting should be set up with Don Smartt, Marlene Case from Capital Alternatives, the Manager and the Council liaisons.

There was a unanimous consensus to coordinate a meeting in an effort to have the County reclassify the Community Development grant money.

Mayor Weinstein suggested they appoint Don Smartt as the Volunteer EDC Administrator. He has now offered his services to the EDC on a volunteer basis, continuing the position he has been as Administrator. It would give him more credibility and make him accountable to the Council. He suggested that this be an annual appointment. The first appointment would expire December 31, 2009. He would let us know the issues ahead of time.

Councilmember Trawinski stated he was supportive of the concept but he had a conflict question for Attorney Rosenberg. Years ago he had received a campaign contribution from Don Smartt as did Councilmember Baratta. He did not think this fell in the gambit of pay to play because it is a volunteer position with no compensation. Attorney Rosenberg advised since there was no compensation and the contribution was made in 2005. Attorney Rosenberg asked him if he could act objectively on the appointment. He did not see a conflict.

Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated he would like to see Mr. Smartt make a statement that he would not make any other contributions. Councilmember Trawinski stated he had no problem with that. Mr. Smartt said he could assure them he has not made any contributions to anyone.

Deputy Mayor Swain thanked Mr. Smartt for volunteering his time and it is good there will be continuity. Mr. Smartt stated they were making huge progress in many arenas. He wanted to make sure that Fair Lawn gets the highest benefit. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated he would like the reassurance that the Broadway SID or River Road SID would not incur any additional expenses as a result of his volunteering. Mr. Smartt stated he was donating his services and no one else is compensating him.

Councilmember Trawinski asked if he would be accountable to the Council and report back to them. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated they would be doing this by resolution.

**BOROUGH GREEN COMMITTEE:**

Deputy Mayor Swain stated she has received a number of requests from various individuals wanting to be on the committee. She thought they should formalize the committee and move forward.

Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated they had talked about the number of people on the committee. There is a resolution the Borough is required to do. Councilmember Trawinski wondered if they could get a list of people that want to be on the committee. Deputy Mayor Swain stated she has twelve so far.

Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated they would get assistance with minutes, etc. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated there would be Borough employees that could take the suggestion and move along with that. She said they have to do the resolution at the next meeting.

There was a unanimous consensus to move the committee forward.

Energy Audit – Councilmember Baratta thought this was done a while ago. Acting Manager Kwasniewski showed them a draft of what the Borough is proposing to do. She said they have proposed to do this building, the Community Center, the building on Saddle River Road and the Senior Center. Gathering the usage on each building was the hardest pieces.

There was a unanimous consensus to move forward with the energy ordinance.

**DOBROW SPORTS COMPLEX SWING SET:**

Councilmember Trawinski stated they had already gotten the answer from Acting Manager Kwasniewski. It was a dangerous condition so it was removed.

**OUTSTANDING CAPITAL PROJECTS:**

Councilmember Trawinski stated he had a list of projects and just wanted to make sure things weren't falling by the wayside. The Manager acknowledged there were some discrepancies on the list and will sit down with the CFO to see what is going on. He questioned the Open Space acquisition funds, they appropriate \$400,000 in 2006, they appropriated \$450,000 in 2007, did they appropriate another \$655,000 in 2008 or was that a combination of items. Mayor Weinstein thought it was for the turf field. He thought the \$655,000 was a combination of items. Acting Manager Kwasniewski thought it was for fencing and other items.

Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated they should think about when the capital ordinances are passed and accepted by the Council as part of the Capital Budget that the employees know that they are supposed to go out to do the project. Some of these projects languish. His concern was they don't really need it. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated at Department Head meetings, that if they have not used the money for a project, they really did not need it. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated in 1998 he and

Councilmember Trawinski said either use it or lose it. Councilmember Trawinski stated they cleaned up ten or fifteen outstanding balances. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated they have gone over this with the Department Heads. CFO Eccleston stresses it to the departments.

### **CLOTHING BINS:**

Attorney Rosenberg advised they had gotten a memo from the Planning Board Secretary saying the fee should be \$300 for the application for the clothing bins for charitable organizations. He followed up as to why that amount and was told because the ordinance requires that a minor site plan approval be obtained from the Planning Board. He wonders if the Council wanted to lower it or did they want to implement the Municipal Land Use Law which allows them to waive a fee for charitable intuitions on site plan review.

Councilmember Trawinski felt \$300 was not an unreasonable cost. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated she will tell the Planning Board Secretary. Mayor Weinstein stated he would vote no because if it was for a charity that would be too much. Councilmember Trawinski stated they have expedited the process and covered the basic administrative fees. It is part of doing business. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated they would not be giving the Borough an escrow fee. The Council could have had the Construction Code Official make the decision instead of the Planning Board. Then there would be no cost. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated that clothing bins are being operated with companies that make a profit.

There was a consensus to charge \$300 for the application for the clothing bins for charitable organizations with Mayor Weinstein dissenting.

### **SEWER EVALUATION:**

Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated she needed some guidance from the Council because this evaluation was not in the 2009 budget. Engineering asked Malcolm Pirnie for two studies that could evaluate the two causes of the backup. Backup occurs when the sewage flow exceeds the pipe capacities or when the pipes are restricted or collapsed. The System Model, which is less expensive, with an anticipated cost that is between \$100,000 to \$150,000 depending upon the extent of the information available in the GIS system. The Condition Assessment, which is more expensive, would look to see if there are blockages or collapsed pipes. They put the equipment down there and photograph all the pipes to see what is going on. The estimate for that is \$225,000. These estimates are based on what other communities have spent.

Mayor Weinstein wondered what the ultimate goals were. Acting Manager Kwasniewski advised that this project would just be the study. Mayor Weinstein stated the study would be a waste if capital improvements were not made as suggested in the study. He also wondered what the Engineer's opinion is on doing this study and more importantly with the system. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated the Engineer has consistently

said there is no problem. Mayor Weinstein said but they continue to happen when there are flash floods. He wondered if they could help the resident by putting this check valve in and see if it works. Acting Manager Kwasniewski wondered if he meant the Borough putting it in. Deputy Mayor Swain stated instead of spending the money perhaps they could install the check valve.

Attorney Rosenberg advised that he would investigate it. He knows that the issue is liability for the Borough. Once the check valve is in, there would be ongoing maintenance issues that would have to be investigated. He felt they should rely upon the Borough Engineer's opinion. They should look into how many houses are involved. Acting Manager Kwasniewski pointed out that if they do it for one, they would have to do for all. Councilmember Trawinski stated it is not a problem that he thought they should ignore. These people in that area had effluent in their homes. They have as much right to address this problem as people who see over development as a problem. He recognized that government is about setting priorities. He understood there was a risk from the legal perspective that if they study it and determine there is a problem, they should fix it. On the other hand, in the history of this Borough, there have been times where Councils ignored signs of things that needed to be fixed. They spent more money on patch work fixes instead of addressing the problem. He thought they need to find a cost effective way to address the problem. He felt they need to determine if they have a problem or not. It seems there is a mindset on the part of the State and the Federal Government acting as a supplier over a period of time to provide funds for capital improvements and this may be the opportunity to make that determination. This obviously is not a ready to go project. This is a problem they should face. He cannot imagine what these people lived through having effluent floating in their basement.

Deputy Mayor Tedeschi wondered if the proposal from the engineering firm was for a system wide evaluation. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated on the condition assessment they do 10%, they don't do all of the system. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated the system is 75 miles long so they would check approximately 7 miles. The Engineer said there is a problem the Borough cannot solve because of the backup coming out of Paterson. He suggested going to the problem and evaluating just that area and determine the cost for that. If the engineering firm comes back and says they found no problem they could fix, then the Borough has done there due diligence.

Councilmember Trawinski stated that sounds reasonable to him. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi said if a resident comes in and says they are still getting sewer backups in their house, the Borough would be able to say they cannot fix it because the lines are clean here. Mayor Weinstein stated that was a good idea. They would not be adding additional liability by adding the check valve but not adding cost to the study because they are focusing on that area. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated they would be shrinking the study to where they perceive the problem exists. Councilmember Trawinski stated he thought they decided to start this when they appropriated the funds two years ago. Deputy Mayor Tedeschi stated they never clarified it.

There was a unanimous consensus to narrow the scope of the project.

**RAPID RECTANGULAR FLASHING BEACONS (BIC):**

Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated this is one of things that is moving rapidly. They are looking for the Borough to guarantee that if the lighting has to be improved, the Borough would assume the additional cost.

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Mr. Smartt stated it is the unit cost for any updated lighting. The area is rather dark so if they put the enhancers in, they will need additional lighting. Councilmember Trawinski asked for a ballpark figure. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated they did not have a figure because they need to do a study to determine what is needed. The DOT Engineer estimated it would not be a lot even if they do need to do upgrades. Councilmember Trawinski stated this would provide enhanced lighting at a dark train station. He realized the flashing beacons provide safety for the pedestrians. He thought Acting Manager Kwasniewski should get a ballpark figure. Mr. Smartt stated it would be a monthly cost. Elmwood Park has already signed off on this project. They will not be able to move forward with this until they receive a letter saying the Borough will pick up the monthly charges. Councilmember Trawinski stated he would like to know the ballpark figure. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated she should know the information for the August meeting.

**GRANT APPLICATIONS:**

Mayor Weinstein suggested they put in the skateboard park and the possible purchase of the Naugle property. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated they would approve do the resolutions on Tuesday. She will work with the Engineer on the second one. In regard to the skate park, they are looking at putting it over by Warren Point Annex by removing the tennis court that is not used. It is not really a residential area. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated Ridgewood put one in last year and they bought equipment that can be moved. They put it away in the winter. They believe the JIF will approve the site. The Borough would not be able to do anything without the JIF's approval. They even give a list of vendors to buy from. Superintendent Graff felt the tennis court was in good shape and would not need to be resurfaced.

Deputy Mayor Tedeschi asked if Ridgewood's skate park was approved. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated it was.

**INTER-LOCAL AGREEMENT – RIDGEWOOD AUTO PARTS:**

Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated when Ridgewood bid out their auto parts, they put a provision that the bid could be extended to other municipalities. The Borough has been having a problem with the one State approved vendor, Auto Zone. The DPW Superintendent compared the prices that Ridgewood got on their bid and they are lower than Auto Zone's. Ridgewood passed a resolution authorizing Fair Lawn to participate

so now a resolution would be needed from Fair Lawn. The Borough should save a considerable amount of money.

Councilmember Baratta asked where Ridgewood gets their parts from. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated P&A supplies the auto parts. Councilmember Baratta wondered why they could buy from them and Fair Lawn could not. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated they went out to bid.

There was a unanimous consensus to move forward with the inter-local agreement with Ridgewood.

Councilmember Trawinski felt the governor should really help the municipalities out with things like this. He could also help the Borough in other ways. If they are serious about shared services, they could provide some sort of benefit to the municipality that offers the shared service and to the municipality that receives the shared service. A lot of times, Fair Lawn is the better neighbor providing services. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated this is one of the few times the Borough would be a recipient.

#### **HIRING POLICE OFFICERS VIA THE ALTERNATE ROUTE:**

Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated this was another good thing that she thought they should support. She did not know if the legislation would do anything but there would be no harm in writing a letter asking if they would. It has the potential to save a lot of money if the Civil Service towns are allowed to do this. They need the support of the legislators. Currently this bill would allow the State Parole Board to hire alternate route trained police officers. Under the alternate route program individuals attend the police academy on their own time and at their own expense. Acting Manager Kwasniewski explained that currently the Borough pays for the physical, the psychological testing, the salary and benefits for each candidate. The other benefit of the alternate route program is that individuals are ready as soon as they are hired eliminating a nine month wait. They would still have to do their field training but that is only three months.

There was a unanimous consensus to adopt a resolution asking the legislation to amend Bill A2690.

#### **SPECIAL MEETING:**

Upon motion by Councilmember Baratta and a second by Deputy Mayor Swain the meeting was adjourned to the Special Meeting at 9:40 P.M.

Mayor Weinstein reconvened to the Work Session at 9:41 P.M.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENTS:**

Anna DiNardo, 13-06 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, voiced her concerns about the Fair Lawn Avenue Bridge. She attended the meeting in Paterson regarding the bridge. She was concerned about the truck traffic going into Paterson towards the Home Depot. Mayor Weinstein reminded her there was a weight limit on the bridge. Ms. DiNardo said the

bridge will not have a top on it so trucks will be able to use it. She felt it should have a historical look. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated Passaic County had come to a meeting several years ago and they still have not moved forward with any plans.

Harry Poster, 13-10 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, asked about the electronic scrap in the DPW yard. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated the Recycling Coordinator was out due to surgery but she will check into it.

Mr. Poster felt in regard to the check valves, it would push the problem to another house.

Harvey Rubinstein, 17-38 Chandler Drive, questioned what happened with the water. Some people received multiple calls while other people did not receive any. Mayor Weinstein stated there was a water main break and the water pressure dropped. Acting Manager Kwasniewski stated if the number is unlisted they would have to register it with the Office of Emergency Management.

Mr. Rubinstein said he had brought the problem of the high and low temperatures at the Recreation Center to Superintendent Graff. The Borough should go back to the contractor because there may be a problem in the software.

Mr. Rubinstein spoke about the solar system and would like to see the analysis when the Borough gets it.

Craig Miller, 5 Ramapo Terrace, spoke about the fluctuating heat in the card room. He was in the room the other day and it was at a level temperature. In regard to check vales, some companies recommend double check valves. He said there should be one price for the fireworks tickets.

Don Smartt stated the reverse system worked. He also did a broadcast e-mail to let everyone know about the problem with the water. He received calls from all over, it did work.

### **Adjournment**

Upon motion by Councilmember Trawinski and seconded by Deputy Mayor Swain the meeting was adjourned at 9:56 P.M.
